

Peace Pro Award Program

Hello Peace Pro Candidate!

Thank you for considering taking part in the Lucy's Kids for Peace Award Program in an effort to earn the title of Peace Pro and the scholarship award that comes along with it! Service to others is an integral part of Kids for Peace. The service projects you choose are a reflection of who you are as a youth leader as well as your interests and passions.

The mission of the Peace Pro Award Program is to engage the youth of Lucy's Kids for Peace in self-directed service projects in order to foster youth leadership while meeting needs within our community and beyond.

The primary purposes of your Peace Pro service projects are:

- to learn leadership and organizational skills skills and to improve or demonstrate leadership skills you already have
- to gain a greater understanding of needs within your community and beyond, and to help in meeting those needs
- to understand the value of seeing projects through to completion

Structure of the Peace Pro Award Program

Candidates must complete one self-directed project per school-year (for a minimum of two years and a maximum of 6 years) and the scholarship will be awarded upon high school graduation. Candidates will receive guidance throughout the projects from an adult mentor. Starting the program in 7th grade will allow a candidate to receive the maximum scholarship amount. Projects must be completed in consecutive years and the final project must be completed during the 12th grade year. (Example: if a candidate completes projects in 7th and 8th grades but not in 9th grade, they could complete 3 consecutive projects in 10th, 11th, and 12th for a maximum of 25%. If a candidate completes projects in only 7th, 8th and 9th grades, they are not eligible to receive the award. It is crucial to do a project each school year once you begin and not skip a year.)

Eligibility

All registered Lucy's Kids for Peace members are eligible starting the summer following their 6th grade year. Candidates must maintain annual membership in Lucy's Kids for Peace in order to remain eligible. Involvement in other LKFP events throughout the year is strongly encouraged.

Choosing a Project / Requirements

Choosing a Project

Your project can be for a community organization, religious institution, school, etc. Internet searches as well as conversations with parents, teachers, peers, and leaders of various community organizations can lead to ideas for projects. You may also get ideas from past Lucy's Kids for Peace projects. Your projects may build upon each other from year to year or they may be unrelated to your previous projects.

Requirements

- The project must present an opportunity for planning and leadership.
- The project must not be the same as a prior project you've completed for the Peace Pro program. The beneficiary may be the same and it may build upon a previous project, but you cannot simply repeat a project.
- The project must be something that can be accomplished in a reasonable amount of time. Remember that you have until the end of the summer to complete each grade's project. Once you start the next grade, you cannot turn in a project for the previous grade.
- Routine labor or tasks is not normally appropriate for a project. This would include a job or service you may normally do as part of your daily life, or a routine job normally done by the beneficiary.
- A project may not be primarily a fundraiser. In other words, your main goal should not be to collect money. Fundraising is permitted for obtaining materials and facilitating a project. Money may be collected as part of the project, but it should not be the primary focus.
- No more than one Peace Pro candidate may receive credit for a specific project. Others may volunteer for the project but it must be led by one member.
- A candidate may get credit for only one project per school year.
- Projects completed during the summer may count toward the grade just finished OR the
 upcoming grade, Two projects could be completed over a summer (one for the previous
 grade and one for the upcoming grade). The deadline for completing a project for a given
 grade is the first day of the subsequent school year. (Example: the deadline for submitting a
 7th grade project is the first day of 8th grade.) The project is considered complete when the
 Project Report is submitted.

3 Steps to Completing a Peace Pro Service Project

- 1. PROPOSAL
- 2. PLAN
- 3. REPORT

1. Your Proposal

Your proposal must be prepared first using the Project Proposal form. It is an overview of your project including details about the steps you will take to complete it and who will benefit. You will submit your proposal for approval before you begin working on your project.

Your proposal must show your chapter leader that your project:

- 1. provides opportunity for planning and leadership.
- **2. results in a benefit or service.** An individual, group, or organization should benefit from your project.
- **3. is feasible.** The project is realistic for you to complete within the time frame you've indicated.


Remember that this is only the beginning of planning. Most of your planning will come with the next step (your Plan). As a reminder, do not begin any work, raise any money, or get any supplies or materials until your proposal has been approved.

2. Your Plan

After your proposal has been approved, you will complete the Project Plan form to put together more details on the steps you will take to complete your project including a timeline, volunteer needs, materials needed, etc. You will submit your project plan and once it is approved, you may begin working on your project!

3. Your Report

After finishing your project, you will complete a report. The report is an opportunity to evaluate the project, the benefit to the beneficiary or recipient, and the planning and leadership you provided. You will attach copies of your Proposal and Plan to your Report and submit all three documents together. Your signature on this form confirms that you led and executed the project. You will also get a signature from the beneficiary or recipient (if applicable).






